## The Pastor's Pen

|remember one of the Thanksgivings when I did not return home to be with family, while I lived in Virginia. I accepted an invitation to join a minister-friend's wife and him at his family's table. The meal took place at his parents' house; present were his parents, his wife's grandparents, his brother and his brother's girlfriend, a family of ministry colleagues from Korea, and me. I asked what I could offer, and they told me to bring my homemade cranberry sauce.

We were twelve people sitting at the table in a dining room that easily and comfortably accommodated us. We each shared stories about things for which we were thankful. We ate well. We laughed. I learned some Korean words (of which I remember none, much now [I'm sure] to Dr. Lee's dismay). Though we were from different families and spanned four generations, for that moment, we were one.

You know, this is what church looks like. Real church. This is the real kind of church where the bounty of food nearly matches the abundance of love and hospitality. A person can bring runny cranberry sauce (we had to use a slotted spoon), and it is appreciated for being an attempt. It is the real kind of church that welcomes people of all races and generations to sup together, tell stories, listen to new words, and be thankful. This is the real church Christ calls us to be. Sometimes (long before and since then), I have caught glimpses of the "real church." I can't help but to feel privileged to have been a part of that church on that special, all-American day.

This month, I would like to thank you for being the real church. Not that you (we) always are that... but for the times when you (we) are. I enjoy when we come to the Lord's Table to be with each other and are willing to share Christ's table with strangers from foreign lands or even strangers who may or may not
share your (our) own blood, customs, or traditions. It's in these little moments when we see a glimpse of what heaven must really be. I enjoy these moments, because it gives us something to aim for, and it is something to which I hope we always strive.

As we approach Thanksgiving, ponder how you may experience that heavenly moment-when you catch a glimpse of God. When you have discovered it for the first time or re-experienced it again for an uncounted instance, I pray it will rejuvenate you and inspire you in your Christian walk. It is what keeps me coming back for more-to church, to people, and to the Table.

May your bounty of blessing be forever abundant with love,

(By the way, I never figured out why my cranberry sauce was runny.)

## Session Notes

At the 16 October 2023 Stated Session meeting, Session:

- Received a devotion from Robert Dearman about spiritual gifts that reside within us and bringing them out into the open;
- Delayed receiving minutes from the 19 August 2023 Stated Session until December;
- Received the Treasurer's Report, noting that with one-quarter of the church's fiscal year remaining, we are at $65 \%$ of our budgeted income for the year and at 56\% of our budgeted expenditure. Donnie requests members to continue to give as they are able into their pledges for the year;
- Heard a report from the Endowment Board that the 2024 Endowment Disbursement will be \$139,601.43;
- Approved a Consent Docket revision to the upcoming minutes of 19 August 2023 for the date of 15 October 2023 to be listed for the Sacrament of Baptism for Truitt Thomas Beavers \& Lane Gabriel Beavers;
- Received James Lucas into membership (child, Nora Lucas) and approved a request by James Lucas and Dr. Hanna Lee for the Sacrament of Baptism for Sara Lee Lucas on 3 Dec. 2023;
- Approved a motion from Christian Education to add Nancy Tharpe to the committee;
- Approved a motion from Property to soft wash the Sanctuary, Preschool, and Manse with C\&S Power Washing for \$16,000 funded by the Endowment Allocation;
- Approved a motion from Property to accept the proposal from Church Interiors (along with a narthex floor amendment) for $\$ 410,000$. Funding for this project will occur through the Centennial Capital Campaign, with directions from the Finance \& Stewardship Committee;
- Approved a motion from Worship to combine several Session-designated Funds into one "General Music Fund" for the benefit of the music program;
- Approved a motion from Worship to purchase 300 copies of the PCUSA's Glory to God, a new hymnal to replace the blue hymnal in the sanctuary at a cost of $\$ 25.00$ each from Undesignated Funds. Family and friends will be able to dedicate a hymnal in honor or in memory of loved ones;
- Approved a motion from Worship to add Jim Pickett, Sherry Harris, \& Jane Lentz to the list of collection counters to assist Donnie Haynes, Richard Hanson, \& Wendell Worthington;
- Approved a motion to allow an offering during the Christmas Concert (17 December 2023) to benefit the McGuffin Music Fund;
- Approved a motion to temporarily remove the three diagonal pews from the West End side of the Sanctuary during Advent to accommodate several events for the Advent/Christmas season. These will be removed prior to the arrival of the Chrismon Tree;
- Did not approve a motion from Property to install glass panels in the doors to the Sanctuary to allow them to close while still maintaining line of sight for safety to the front doors (six REs abstained from the vote to five affirmative votes -while the abstentions would side with the motion, it was decided this was too narrow to be considered approved);
- Updated the church membership lists to reflect requests and changes that have come since the update of 19 August 2023, and
- Prayed for members of the congregation and situations of the world.

The next Stated Session meeting is scheduled for Monday, 18 December 2023 with Sloan Goforth leading the devotional and prayer.

## Capital Campaign "Kick-Off"

At the Session meeting of 16 October 2023, the Session endorsed and approved the motion from Property to begin the process of preparing to renovate the Sanctuary for the Centennial Celebrations of the building in 2025. As a part of this conversation, the Centennial Sub-committee held a conversation with members of the congregation on Rally Day in September to share the work to be done and the costs involved for such improvements.

As of this Session meeting, the work will cost about $\$ 410,000$, which includes a contingency of $5 \%$ (for extra work, issues that may arise through the work, and the natural increase of material cost). This increase also reflects an addition to the work for the improvement and updating of the narthex flooring and décor. How we will fund the project will be something that Stewardship \& Finance will help us to discern and implement, but the Property Committee desires you to know what the improvements will be and what they are projected to cost.

In many ways, we can understand this work must be done in order to preserve and promote our Sanctuary into the next century of its use. We have dreamed together and tried to envision its usage across worship, music, and community events. Fortunately, the decisions of the last renovation have been solidly respected, vis-à-vis the current layout of the sanctuary. We do not envision any major changes to the form or function of the sanctuary, with only the improvements to come as a result of time and previous usage upon the items to be updated.

We are also aware that many members may ask the right question, "Is this the best use of our money, when there are so many missions or benevolences we could better do with these resources?" While we must always choose between inward looking and outward vision for who we can serve with the limited resources we
have, we know there are times when we must do the work of addressing some of our internal materials to be a place of welcome for all and for preserving our sanctuary. Costs will always be with us, but they will also only continue to grow the longer we do not address them. Such work does not come easily or without these debates, but the Session trusts in the direction of the Spirit to guide us in this time so that we can soon return to using our revenues for the ministries we are called to give that aren't as interiorly focused.

On the next page, you will find the break down of anticipated / projected costs as provided by the Centennial Committee, a division of FPC's Property Committee. This is the list that was compiled by the sub-committee for its presentation to the congregation for Rally Day and the breakdown of the costs. We have been gifted this building for a season of life-its life-and we humbly ask you to begin considering ways in which you may be able to give financial supplement to our project of preparing it for use for the next generation of its presence for our congregants and the Statesville community.

Enclosed with this newsletter, you will find a stewardship commitment card, which we invite you to submit to the church office by mail or dropping it off earlier than Sunday, 12 November. If you would like to bring your commitment card with you to church on that Sunday, we welcome you to do so, as well.

## Capital Campaign "Kick-Off" (cont'd.)

- Painting

1. Walls and trim: sanded, caulked, and dusted clean prior to any finish application. Also, ceilings and plaster repair.
2. Areas: nave, chancel, balcony, narthex, all stairwells (3), 20 doors and jambs, all staining and painting of handrails and pickets, 10 radiator covers.
\$119,774.00

- Electrical and Lighting

1. Install all lights with 90 -watt LED units (43), including chancel and cove lighting (LED)
2. Sanctuary will be 2 times brighter.
3. Chancel and cove will be 3 times brighter.
4. LEDs will pull less energy - cost savings in the long run, but replacements will be increased over time. Will be a cost savings overall.
5. Replace dimmer system.

- Floor Covering and Floor Refinishing

1. Replace carpet in sanctuary.
2. Refinish existing wood flooring in front of pews and areas left and right of chancel area up to the entrance.
3. Replace carpet in stairwells.
4. Install LVT in choir loft and stairs.

1. All pews (40) of different lengths
2. Choir chairs including reupholstering seat bottoms

3. $1 / 4$ " non-slip foam between the cushion and pew bottoms

## New Hymnal: Glory to God

Hello friends,

Dr. Lee here! I am excited to announce that Session approved for us to get the new Presbyterian hymnal, Glory to God. It was published in 2013 and has been adopted by many Presbyterian congregations throughout the nation and our state. Then, a natural question arises, "Why do we need a new hymnal?"

Here is an introduction to Glory to God:

1. There are more songs in the new hymnal. There are 853 hymns, psalms, and spiritual songs in Glory to God instead of the blue Presbyterian Hymnal we currently have, which has 605 hymns. Glory to God covers all major historical and contemporary sacred genres, including approximately 35 African American/ Gospel hymns, traditional hymns from the Presbyterian Hymnal, older hymns that have never been published in the Presbyterian Hymnal ("Leaning on the Everlasting Arms," "Softly and Tenderly Jesus Is Calling," "I Love to Tell the Story," and "Shall We Gather at the River"), contemporary praise songs ("Awesome God"), and global music (music from six continents and in many different languages). In addition, there are more than twenty songs from the Taizé community.
2. This hymnal features more inclusive and global approaches to our service. Do you recall the first handbell performance of this season with me playing a drum while I was conducting? The song is in the new hymnal, "Amen, We Praise Your Name" is from South Africa and originally written in Swahili. I remember a lot of people truly enjoyed that music because it was fun, done well, and was different (unexpected). There are songs in Chinese, Korean, Taiwan, Spanish, Swahili, Latin, Hebrew, and Arabic. Needless to say, these global selections will allow us to expand our knowledge of worship songs and create a sense of global Christian community around us.
3. This hymnal is presented in a much more userfriendly format for the songs. More than 65\% of the former blue hymnal was brought into this new hymnal, and it features a new font and setting. For example, all the verses are in the lines of music in the new hymnal instead of separating the last two or three verses at the end of the songs. So, it is easy to read and follow for our congregation.
4. Our liturgical heritage can be grown with this hymnal, too. There are more songs for Advent and Lent/Easter seasons. Currently we have twenty songs for Advent. The new hymnal provides six additional songs. Nineteen songs are added to the new hymnal for Lent/Easter seasons on top of the forty-one hymns we already have. This gives us opportunities to expand our repertories for the seasons and be able to still sing our beloved traditional hymns.


Glory to God is filled with simple, engaging, inclusive and beloved songs. I hope this new hymnal would challenge and help us to be more open-minded and appreciate the songs we might not be familiar with.

We welcome family and friends to dedicate a new hymnal in honor or in memory of your loved one(s) with the order forms that are located outside the office or in this month's newsletter.

## 2023 Stewardship Season

Stewardship Season will conclude on Sunday, 12 November 2022 during worship. In 2024, we will push our Capital Campaign (see pages 4-5) and ask you to continue to do the good work you have been a part of for our 2023 budget year.

As you see in the Treasurer's Report from the Session Notes (page 3), the committees and Session have done a very fine job of developing a budget into which we have lived responsibly and fiscally through the year. Though having unexpected costs that have been incurred with the Rev. Anthony Lamourt's necessary departure and the search toward Dr. Hanna Lee, increased costs for the upkeep and cleaning of the church buildings throughout the week, and other incidentals felt throughout the year, the church has done a great job through your faithfulness to live into the commitment you offered last year.

Another place of stepping out in faith is our desire to hire a Director of Christian Educator in the near future. The Personnel Committee has joined with the Christian Education Committee to examine what options exist, as this will require significant increases to our 2024 budget, along with the natural increases to costs and uses we incur. Please continue to pray and seek God's voice for how you may be able to offer yourself through your time, talents, treasures, and tithes.

Stewardship talk is never fun and rarely appears to be rewarding. Yet, as Donnie reminds us, while we are at presently lower than our planned income for the year, your contributions beyond money also make our programs work. Your faithful contribution of time and talents through work on committees and the sporadic events that pop up at church are also crucial for the ways we function, and we thank you for your impact toward our community. As we continue into the next year, we encourage you to share yourself as you are able for God's glory. Join a committee, share your wisdom, and help us make real the rewards that are happening all around because of your love for FPC, Statesville and our neighbors.
